

Hybrid Vigor

ne of the qualities prized by Blazer owners is that Blazer Horses possess great "hybrid vigor". Hybrid vigor is defined by increase in stature, biomass, and fertility that characterizes the progeny of crosses between diverse parents, such that the progeny is superior to the better of the two partents. The opposite of the hybrid is an evolutionary bottle neck. An evolutionary bottleneck will produce offspring that exhibit the worst traits of a set of parents. In the evolution of horses over 50 million years, nature allowed horses to line breed (sire to daughter or mother to son) for 3 to 4 generations. This was due to the fact that a herd stallion could hold his band together for this length of time, producing offspring out of his daughters and granddaughters, before he was ousted by a younger stallion (that typically came from a different band). If new genetics did not come into the herd, it would approach an evolutionary bottleneck. A herd without new blood would weaken and die out.

In a large gene pool numbering in the tens of thousands of individual animals the chances of an evolutionary bottleneck are limited by wise breeders. It is the goal of every breeder of horses to have the offspring be better than the parents. That is our goal today.

The varied breeds of horses that Little Blaze descended from (Morgan, Thoroughbred, Quarter Horse and Shetland) were the beginning of hybrid vigor in the Blazer Horse. Neil Hinck



further enhanced this quality by the selection of diverse foundation mares. These mares were chosen

for their personal traits and not for any specific breed. Indeed, many of these first mares were crossbred mares themselves. The rules of registration in the American Blazer Horse Handbook state that in order for registration all offspring need to have 8 out of the 15 animals on a 4 generation pedigree (counting the resultant offspring) to come from registered Blazer horses. This is to ensure that outside blood can continue to infuse the Blazer breed and still not lose the traits that make up a Blazer horse. When looking for an outside bloodline to breed into the American Blazer Horse breeders need to be diligent to only bring in animals that can represent and enhance our breed. Some of the traits that a breeder needs to be keeping in mind while looking at potential animals for breeding purposes are: 13 hh to 15 hh at maturity, solid color coat patterns with no white above the knees or hocks (except for acceptable face markings) with solid colored eyes, good bone to body mass ratio (7 inches around the cannon bone just below the knee for a thousand pound animal), clean throat latch, short coupling, well rounded croup, long hip and underline, good feet and overall soundness. Educate yourself as much as possible by researching the prospective breeding animal's history and it's past pedigree. And always bear in mind disposition!

Several years ago the board of the American Blazer Horse Association recognized the fact that the Blazer breed has a limited number of breeding animals. The board lifted the 8 out of 15 rule for a ten year period of time in order to accelerate the opportunity to bring outside blood into the Blazer gene pool. This has produced numerous fine Blazer horses! These offspring from this program are no less designated as "outcrosses" ...remember that the Blazer breed from the beginning is the ultimate in outcrossing resulting in great hybrid vigor!

merican Blazer Horses continue to show how their positive attributes can be applied to many different disciplines.


Dressage is an equine discipline that involves the execution of precise movements by training a horse to respond to barely perceptible signals from the





rider while improving a horse's strength and maintaining a calm, attentive demeanor. A horse's pace and movements are importatn to this sport that dates back to 350 B.C. Horse and rider perform memorized patterns during dressage competitions while

appearing effort-free.

have started their second year of showing in dressage during 2023. Laura has been riding horses for 51 years and has previously competed in jumping, barrel racing and pole bending. In 2018, 3 year old Hope became Laura's 1st American Blazer Horse, with sire Sleepy Streak and dam Crystal Clear. Prior to dressage, Laura and



hope had participated in Showmanship and Equine Trail Sports. Laura's first show year of dressage was in 2021. Laura and Hope had their 1st dressage show this year at Liberty Grove Farm in

Spokane, Washington April 15th, showing in Training Level 1 and Introduction C classes with 7 competitors. They had amazing rides and placed 1st in Training Level 1 and 2nd in Introduction C! Laura has enjoyed dressage because it allows the rider to be insync with their horse and each ride is progressively training the horse, while building the riders strength. Laura has seen many improvements becoming more smooth while learning to reach out and having gained an

unflappable demeanor during shows. Laura plans to compete again in October with a goal of completing Training Level 1 and 2 classes.


We love to see American Blazer Horses and their owners continue to compete in a variety of events and hope that everyone has a successful year in whichever adventure you choose.

What Is A Blazer Horse?

- To be considered a Blazer Horse, the horse must have at least one registered parent with a documented line to the foundation stallion, "Little Blaze."
- Blazer Horses must be between 13 hands and 15 hands at full maturity to
- be registered.

 Blazer Horses must have a solid coat color with dark underlying skin. These colors include brown, black, bay, and sorrel, as well as buckskin, palomino, and many shades of dun.

 White markings are limited to the face and below the knee or hock. Spotted coat patterns (appaloosa, pinto, paints) are not accounted into the register.
- paints) are not accepted into the registry.
 To be advanced into the Stud Book, both mares and stallions must be inspected by a veterinarian or certified inspector.
