Miss Spokane Interstate Rodeo Queen by Amelie Johnson

Johnson and I had the Johnson and I had the pleasure of reigning as the 2023 Miss Spokane Interstate Rodeo Queen. This job was no small task and I genuinely could not have completed my year without my American Blazer Horse, New Asset, or Newt, by my side. To be a rodeo queen fulfilled a childhood dream of mine. As a little girl, I grew up watching my local rodeos and



was completely dazzled by the charismatic, athletic, and stunning women flying past me in chaps and crowns. I knew that one day I wanted to be one of those girls.

Newt and I have been a team for my entire young adult life, he has been my wings through every challenge I've faced us with. So I knew I could trust him to carry me through the

horsemanship portion of the pageant, however, I didn't have full confidence I could carry myself through the pageant. For months, I reviewed and studied cover to cover of the PRCA Handbook, made rodeo term flashcards, and talked with

every rodeo queen I could including former Miss Rodeo America, Katherine Merck. In doing so, I flourished in the knowledge I received and felt my confidence growing with every passing day. Finally, pageant day arrived and all of my nerves from before subsided and I felt that although I hadn't officially won the crown yet I had earned something much deeper and was happy with whatever outcome the day held. At 2:30 on February 4th, my life changed forever as I was crowned the new Miss Spokane Interstate Rodeo and had won every category in the pageant including my most favorite: horsemanship! I didn't realize the grandeur of the year ahead of me, but I knew I was going to be the best queen I possibly could be so long as I had Newt by my side. There were several memorable moments with Newt throughout the year, some of which include walking down the streets of Spokane at night covered in dazzling lights and flowy flowers, being asked to use Newt for a group of several children with disabilities to pet and handle because of his soft demeanor, and flying across the Spokane arena with Old Glory in the most beautiful presentation of our colors my coordinator had ever seen. However, one of the best stories I can tell you from my year that beautifully depicts Newt and I's relationship is at the Omak Stampede. The Omak Stampede is a historical rodeo dating back many years. It runs alongside an Indian Encampment and the arena itself is a dome inside a valley. I was warned that horses have a difficult time at this rodeo, they have to run down a hill to get into the arena, the stands hold about 8,000 spectators, and because of the shape and lowered state of the arena every noise in the dirt booms around you. To say I was a little nervous was an understatement as I watched several horses ahead of me lose their confidence and have a difficult time with the atmosphere. However, Newt handled this arena like a

a seasoned pro and this proved to be one of my proudest moments of the year. We ran in and he did his job so profoundly, it brought tears to my eyes! He even had enough confidence to be a buddy horse to other queen horses around him that were having a difficult time! We had two beautiful presentation runs, but on the third day during warm up he tripped and fell in the arena and I knew something was wrong. It took me just a few seconds to look him over, watch him


walk and quickly decide to pull us from the rodeo. I was asked if I wanted to ride another horse for the evening, but I knew at that moment Newt needed me so I gladly declined and we rested together the rest of the evening.

The relationship we are honored to have with these horses is something that should not be taken for granted. Newt proved himself not only to be an incredible horse with a deep confidence in himself and me throughout my year as rodeo queen, but showed me how important our friendship is. We faced many intense situations along the rodeo road which

taught me vast amounts of lessons, but the one I treasure most of all is that we are friends and partners first with our animals and competitors second. There is no situation, prize, or crown ever worth jeopardizing that relationship.



2024 Idaho Horse Expo by Yvonna Bocci and Linda Crawford

he 2024 Idaho Horse Expo is in the books for this year. It was very wet outside but warm inside the Idaho Horse Park. A huge thank you to Terri Hinck for her hard work in getting the horses for the stall and people scheduled to man the booth. We introduced a lot of new people to the American Blazer Horse, helping us fulfill our mission to "Help people everywhere discover, enjoy and remember American Blazer Horses." It is always a pleasure to also talk to people who have owned or still own Blazer Horses and hear their stories.

Friday morning we started the Expo with Rambo's Santana F967, a twenty nine (29) year old sorrel stallion and his 9 month old sorrel stud colt, Santana and Comet's Captain in the stall together. They were in the stall for almost 8 hours and were stellar examples of the gentle, well behaved American Blazer Horses. People found it hard to believe it was two stallions together and they were very calm and friendly. They had their picture



on Channel 6 News and Linda Crawford did a short interview on the American Blazer Horses.

Friday evening, Allison and Kevin Layton brought Abigail (Abby) their thirteen (13) year old daughter and her horse EEC Better than a Bentlee F2066 to be in the stall. They returned again, early Saturday morning to be in the booth stall and also rode in the Breed Showcase Saturday evening. Abby and Bentlee represented the American Blazer Horse Association with only 2 days notice. She roped, did barrels, and did jumps including clearing a four (4) foot jump, all while riding bareback! She said she had not jumped that high before. Abby has done all the roping training herself as well as doing cow penning to get Bentlee used to cattle. They did a stellar job

Bentlee was bred by Stevee and Lori Keller and was born in 2017, so he is only 7 yrs old. The Layton's bought him in 2021, they have only had him three (3)

years. Abby and Bentlee have been out competing in the barrel racing circuit in the Treasure Valley. Abby and Bentlee have also competed in the National Junior High School rodeo for two (2) years now. In 2022

she qualified and competed at Idaho State Junior High School rodeo in the barrels. In 2023 she qualified and competed in the National Jr High School Rodeo (NJHSR) in barrels. This year she plans on competing on Bentlee in barrels, pole bending, goat tying and break-away roping at the Junior High School Rodeo Association. We wish them the best of luck.

In the summer of 2023 she competed in Barrel racing at four (4) rodeos in four weeks and won four(4)

championship belt buckles, besides doing her weekly barrel racing around the area. Allison and Kevin took Abby and Bentlee to the All in Barrel Race in Las Vegas last fall. There she won fifth in the 3D division, competing with riders of all ages, many of which have been barrel racing for years. The 3D division is only one (1) second off the top times in the nation. There were six hundred fifty (650) contestants. What a great job for a twelve (12) year old girl and her six (6) year old American Blazer Horse gelding. Abby and Bentlee have earned almost \$10,000 in just 1.5 years besides the 4 belt buckles and a bunch of other horse items.

Saturday afternoon, Shawna Crawford had her twelve (12) year old grulla gelding, Linda's Cowboy F1959 in the stall for three (3) hours. This was his first time off the ranch and around a crowd and lots of new noises. Cowboy did a great job of

representing the blazer horses. He settled down quickly and really didn't react very much to the new noises and commotion around him. Cowboy was very impressive, standing at fifteen hands, stocky, calm and gentle. Shawna had lots of offers wanting to buy him, so she put up a sign, "Cowboy Not for Sale."

Saturday late afternoon and evening, Santana's Dotter F2065, a four (4) year old sorrel filly owned by David Crawford was in the booth stall. She has been at the expo the past 2 years. San-D, as we call her, was very calm and well behaved, except for reaching through the stall bars and trying to eat Yvonna's lunch and unplugging the computers to the booth behind us. She is very inquisitive and mischievous and not afraid of very much. San-D stands about 13.3 and is very stocky and filled out.

Sunday morning, Alexis and Nicole Lansdell brought in Pop's San T F1894, their fifteen (15) year old sorrel gelding to represent the American Blazer Horses for the day. They were there all day helping promote the Breed. San T was very well behaved and did an excellent job representing the American Blazer Horses. Alexis has ridden San T in various 4-H events and other events as well.

Besides those that brought in their horses and helped promote the Breed, we also want to thank Yvonna Bocci, Sam Hiskey, Monica Crawford, Sandy Flores, Cheri Jackson and Shay Fisher, Blayze Messner, Xaidyn Harmon, Maybelle Hartness for their help in the booth or with setup and take down. What Is A Blazer Horse?

- To be considered a Blazer Horse, the horse must have at least one registered parent with a documented line to the foundation stallion, "Little Blaze."
- Blazer Horses must be between 13 hands and 15 hands at full maturity to be registered.
- Blazer Horses must have a solid coat color with dark underlying skin. These colors include brown, black, bay, and sorrel, as well as buckskin, palomino, and many shades of dun.
- White markings are limited to the face and below the knee or hock. Spotted coat patterns (appaloosa, pinto, paints) are not accepted into the registry.
- To be advanced into the Stud Book, both mares and stallions must be inspected by a veterinarian or certified inspector.
